Executive Summary:

Community indicators offer a snapshot of our community and how that community has changed in the last decade. Census data, crime statistics, housing information and many other data sources can be used to gain insights into our city and help guide planning efforts for both the municipality and individuals. The resulting profile is an invaluable resource for charting where Anchorage's future could be. This 2012 Anchorage Indicators Report provides the most comprehensive collection of indicators available for the Anchorage area.

This report is a follow up to the Anchorage Municipality's set of indicators compiled in 2000. The report was researched and produced by the Anchorage Economic Development Corporation (AEDC) on behalf of the Municipality. While every effort was made to replicate and improve the original report, in some cases, data was not available to recreate every chart from the 2000 report. All changes in this report from 2000 are detailed in the appendix. In all, 242 elements have been updated, 86 are newly added, and 23 have not been replicated or replaced. 




Anchorage 2010 Population by Census Tract








Anchorage Population Growth by Census Tract, 2000 to 2010





Suitability of Vacant Land For Development, Anchorage Bowl, 2010






Developmental Potential of Land by Acreage, Anchorage Bowl by Planning Subarea, 2010



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









Anchorage Housing Units by Census Tract, 2010








% of Anchorage Housing Units in Multi-Family Structures by Census Tract, 2010








% of Housing Units Occupied by Owner, Anchorage Census Tracts, 2010







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
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




Population by Sex, Anchorage 1980, 1990, 2000 & 2010






Median Age Anchorage & United States, 1970-2010


Age Distribution Comparison U.S. vs Anchorage, 2010
















Male/Female Age Distribution Anchorage 2010






Anchorage Senior Population, Persons 65 & Older, 1960-2010









Minority Population of Anchorage, 1960-2010

Population Growth by Race & Ethnicity, Anchorage % Increase Between 2000 & 2010






Persons Moving In & Out - 2004-05 to 2009-10

% of Population Moving In or Out - 2005 to 2010








Alaska Population by Region, 2010 (Total Population: 710,231)


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


Anchorage Resident Births, 2000-09








% of Anchorage Births By Age of Mother, 2000-09


% of Anchorage Births by Mother's Educational Attainment, 2000-2009






Total Adoptions Anchorage, 1990-2010


Adoptions by Parental Status, Anchorage Municipality, 2010






Anchorage & U.S. Crude Death Rates, 2000-2009 (CDR= Deaths per 100,000 People)


Anchorage Resident Total Deaths by Sex, 2000-2009








% of Total Deaths, Anchorage Persons 65 & Older, 2000-2010


Top Five Causes of Death Anchorage, 2009 (64% of 1,357 Total Deaths)








Accidental Deaths by Race, Anchorage, 2010

Homicide Deaths by Race, Anchorage, 2010




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




Marital Status of Anchorage Residents 15 & Older, 2010







Marriages Per 1,000 Persons Anchorage Residents, 1990-2009






Divorces By Type In Anchorage, 2007-2011






Total Defense Personnel In Alaska by Location, 2009





Anchorage Military Retiree Population, by Zip Code of Residency, 2012








Military Expenditures in Alaska, FY 2009 In Thousand \$

Anchorage Consumer Price Index (CPI-U) Percent Change From Prior Year, 1983-2011






Anchorage Consumer Price Index Annual Change for All Items for All Urban Consumers






Consumer Price Index Major Categories Anchorage Annual % Change, 2010-2011

Consumer Price Index for Selected Items, Anchorage Annual % Change, 2010-2011








Consumer Price Index for All Items Average Annual % Change for U.S. & Anchorage, 1999-2011

Relative Importance of CPI Components U.S. All Urban Consumers, 2010




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


Class of Workers

Anchorage Workers 16 & Older, 1980, 1990, 2000 & 2010






Labor Force Participation Rates Persons 16 & Older U.S. & Anchorage, 2010




Anchorage Annual Employment/Unemployment Totals, 1990-2011







Unemployment Rate by Anchorage Census Tract, 2010






Anchorage Monthly Employment, Jan. 1990-June 2012






Anchorage Employment by Industry, 2011


Anchorage Annual Employment, 1990-2011 (in 1,000's)








Anchorage Annual Total Employment Change 1990-2011


Anchorage Oil & Gas Employment 2001-2011








Job Gains & Losses by Industry Anchorage 2001-2011







% Non-Resident Workers Private Sector Workers in Selected Alaska Areas, 2010









Private Sector Workers & Earnings by Residency Status, Anchorage 2010






















% Advanced or Proficient in Writing, 2010-2011 Standards Based Assessment, ASD Middle Schools








% Advanced or Proficient in Mathematics, 2010-2011 Standards Based Assessment, ASD Middle Schools



Projected ASD High School Capacity Usage, 2016-17












% Advanced or Proficient in Writing, 2010-2011 Standards Based Assessment, ASD High Schools








% Advanced or Proficient in Mathematics, 2010-2011 Standards Based Assessment, ASD High Schools



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


General Government Revenues Anchorage, 2002-2011









General Government Revenues, Municipality of Anchorage, 2002, 2006 & 2011










Anchorage Municipal Per Capita Expenditures 2002-2011










General Municipal Budget by Expense Anchorage 2011



General Municipal Budget by Department Anchorage, 2011 (in Millions of \$s)





General Obligation Bond Proposals, Municipality of Anchorage, 2005-2012 (In Thousands of Dollars)










% of Anchorage Total Employment That Is Government Employment, by Type, 2001-2011








% Government of Total Employment Anchorage, AK, King County, WA & U.S., 2011




State University & Government Employment Anchorage vs Other AK Cities, 2011






Assessed Value (in Billions \$) of Taxable Property Anchorage 1996-2011



Alaska Property Tax Mill Rates Major Communities, 2012



Alaska Sales Tax Rates Major Communities, 2012



Estimated State & Local Taxes For a Family of Three w/\$50,000 Annual Income, Seleceted Cities, 2010










State & Local Tax Comparison Anchorage, AK vs. Los Angeles, CA, 2010 Family of Three w/\$75,000 Household Income








Estimated State & Local Taxes For a Family of Three w/\$75,000 Annual Income, Selected Cities, 2010








Permanent Fund Dividend Payments in Alaska, 1982-2011 (in Millions of \$)


% of Registered Alaskan Voters Who Voted In the 2010 Alaska General Election, By Age








Alaskan Registered Voters By Age March 2012


Alaska Voters by Gender & Party 2010 General Election







Alaska 2010 General Election Voters by Age & Party










April 2012 Registered Voters by Party & Election District




Total Residential Property Sales & Volume, 2000-2012 YTD (Oct. 28), Anchorage Municipality


Total Single-Family Residential Sales & Volume, 2000-2012 YTD (Oct. 28),




Total Condominium Sales & Volume, 2000-2012 YTD (Oct. 28), **Anchorage Municipality**















Average Sale Price of Anchorage Condominiums by Area, 2010 & 2011















Total Alaska MLS Residential Listings, July 2002- July 2012










Average Market Time for Anchorage Properties Sold, 1998-2009


Anchorage Residential Properties Sold by Price Range, July 2011-July 2012






Anchorage Single Family Homes Sold by Area, 2009






Anchorage Population & Rental Vacancy Rate 2000-2011






Average Anchorage Apartment Contract Rents 2000-2011 (Nominal Dollars)

Average Anchorage Apartment Contract Rents 2000-2011, (Real Dollars, AK CPI Adjustment)






Rental Vacancy Rates By # of Bedrooms Anchorage, 2011

Rental Vacancy Rates by Selected Boroughs & Census Areas, 2000 & 2011






Rental Housing Surveyed by Size AHFC Rental Survey, Anchorage 2011



HUD Fair Market Rent- 2 Bedroom Apartments Selected U.S. Metro Areas, 2012





HUD Fair Market Rents, Anchorage 2000-2012



Anchorage Bowl Housing Units by Type












Eagle River/Chugiak Housing Units by Type










Change In Housing Units, 2000-2010 All Anchorage Census Tracts











Total Mobile Homes, Anchorage, 1970-2010


Mobile Homes as a % Of Total Homes Anchorage 1970-2010








Total Value of Building Permits, Anchorage 2006-2010 (In Millions of Dollars)

Commercial Building Permit Value Anchorage, 2006-2010 (In Millions of Dollars)






Residential Building Permit Value Anchorage, 2006-2010 (In Millions of Dollars)

Total New Housing Units Anchorage, 2005-2011






Average Value of Single Family Home Building Permits Anchorage, 2006-2010

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



Annual % Change in Average Wage, Anchorage, 2003-2011






Median Household Income by Anchorage Census Tract, 2010






Median Household Income by Race Anchorage, 2010


Median Household Income by Household Type Anchorage 2010








Per Capita Income (\$s) by Anchorage Census Tracts, 2010












HUD Low Income Guidelines Anchorage, 2012

Federal Poverty Guidelines, U.S. & Alaska, 2012






% of Persons Below Poverty Level Anchorage & U.S., 2010


Percent Below Poverty Level, 2010 Anchorage & U.S.

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
Reported Crime Totals and Rates, Anchorage, 1985-2010
