ANCHORAGE, ALASKA AO No. 2025-28

AN ORDINANCE OF THE ANCHORAGE ASSEMBLY AMENDING ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL CODE SECTION 8.25.070 TO REQUIRE THE REPORT OF LOST OR STOLEN FIREARMS WITHIN 48 HOURS OF DISCOVERY.

WHEREAS, laws that require the reporting of lost and stolen firearms promote public safety by enabling law enforcement to better track firearms used in the commission of a crime and illegal guns; and

WHEREAS, Federal Firearms Licensees are required under, 18 U.S.C. § 923(g)(6), to report any firearm stolen or lost from their inventory within 48 hours of discovery to ATF and to their local law enforcement agency; and

WHEREAS, there is no federal law requiring private citizens to report the theft or loss of a firearm, and currently only 15 states and the District of Columbia require private citizens to report to law enforcement when their weapons are lost or stolen; and

WHEREAS, a yearlong investigation by The Trace and more than a dozen NBC TV stations conducted analysis of more than 23,000 stolen firearms recovered by police between 2010 and 2016 and found that the majority of these weapons were recovered in connection with crimes¹; and

WHEREAS, the overwhelming majority of stolen firearms in the United States originate via thefts from private citizens and not from Federal Firearms Licensees²; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Bureau of Justice Statistics National Crime Victimization Survey estimates that only about 75% of firearm thefts from private citizens are reported to a law enforcement agency³; and

 WHEREAS, a study by the journal Injury Epidemiology indicates the likelihood of a firearm being involved in the commission of a crime increases by a factor of three if the firearm is lost and by a factor of nearly nine if it is stolen from its rightful owner⁴; and

WHEREAS, a 2016 survey Prison Inmates indicated that almost half of the respondents had acquired the firearm used during offense for which they had been convicted either from purchasing it off the street or stolen it from another party⁵; and

WHEREAS, the majority of firearms used in commission of a crime in the State of Alaska originated within the State⁶; and

WHEREAS, APD reports that approximately 400 firearms a year are stolen in Anchorage and 380,000 nationwide. Giffords Law Center reports that nearly half of these guns are never reports to law enforcement and only a small percentage are recovered; and

WHEREAS, mandatory reporting requirements also help return lost guns to their rightful owners and protect gun owners from being wrongly implicated in crimes committed with lost or stolen guns; and

WHEREAS, the Police Executive Research Forum recommends the implementation of laws requiring the reporting of lost or stolen firearms to track and help prevent firearms from entering the black market⁷; and

WHEREAS, the State of Alaska does not require firearm owners to report the loss or theft of a firearm; and

WHEREAS, Alaska Statute 29.35.145 states that "a municipality may not enact or enforce an ordinance regulating the possession, ownership, sale, transfer, use, carrying, transportation, licensing, taxation, or registration of firearms or knives," however the Statutes are silent regarding the authority to mandate the reporting of the loss or theft of a firearm; now, therefore,

THE ANCHORAGE ASSEMBLY ORDAINS:

<u>Section 1.</u> Anchorage Municipal Code section 8.25.070 is hereby amended to read as follows:

8.25.070 Failure to report theft.[PROVISION OF FIREARM TO VIOLENT MINOR BY PARENT OR GUARDIAN. (REPEALED)]

A. It is unlawful for any person who possesses, owns or controls a firearm to fail to report the theft or loss of the firearm to a peace officer or law enforcement agency, providing a description of the firearm including serial number, if known, within 48 hours of knowing, or having reason to know, the firearm is stolen or cannot be located through reasonable

Subject: AN ORDINANCE OF THE ANCHORAGE ASSEMBLY AMENDING

ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL CODE SECTION 8.25.070 TO REQUIRE THE REPORT OF LOST OR STOLEN FIREARMS WITHIN 48

HOURS OF DISCOVERY.

The proposed ordinance amends section 8.25.070 to require anyone who owns or possesses a firearm to report its loss or theft within 48 hours of discovering its loss.

Although Alaska Statute 29.35.145 states that "a municipality may not enact or enforce an ordinance regulating the possession, ownership, sale, transfer, use, carrying, transportation, licensing, taxation, or registration of firearms or knives," this ordinance does not actually require any action or regulate the conduct described by that statute. Rather it only regulates the conduct of a person who has ceased to possess, carry, or control a firearm.
