ANCHORAGE, ALASKA AO NO. 2010–16(S)

AN ORDINANCE OF THE ANCHORAGE MUNICIPAL ASSEMBLY AMENDING ANCHORAGE CODE SECTION 9.28.035, ABATEMENT OF VEHICLES OPERATED BY DELINQUENT OFFENDERS, TO ALLOW A NEW DEFENSE TO VEHICLE IMPOUNDMENT.

THE ANCHORAGE ASSEMBLY ORDAINS:

<u>Section 1.</u> Anchorage Municipal Code section 9.28.035, Abatement of vehicles operated by delinquent offenders, is hereby amended to read as follows (*language indicating no amendment is included for context only; amendments to subsection* 9.28.035L are set out on page 2; other text not amended is not set out):

9.28.035 Abatement of vehicles operated by delinquent offenders.

- Except as identified in this subsection, proof a registered owner or lienholder did not know [KNOWN] or could not reasonably have known the vehicle was operated by another in violation of this section is [NOT] not a defense to the requirements of release under subsection G. or H., as applicable, or to an action under subsection I. The exceptions identified in this subsection apply only when the seizure of the vehicle is exclusively for abatement of vehicles under this section, and the owner of the vehicle is neither the operator of the vehicle nor a person who has accumulated delinquent traffic fines totaling more than \$1,000.00. The person or entity claiming an exception under this subsection must establish there is no reasonable basis for the owner's accountability, and that at least one of the following circumstances applies. Proof by affidavit alone is insufficient to establish an exception.
 - 1. The vehicle owner was serving in a military post overseas when the vehicle was seized while being operated by another.
 - 2. The vehicle meets all state and local registration and emissions inspection requirements, is owned by a bona fide rental car agency, and was rented in good working order under written agreement when the vehicle was seized.
 - 3. The vehicle was stolen at the time it was seized, and the theft was timely reported to the Anchorage Police Department or the Alaska State Troopers.
