




Purpose & Need



What We've Learned So Far

- The transportation network for a vibrant and economically sustainable Downtown must serve a wide range of users:
 - OPedestrians (tourists, Alaska residents, Anchorage residents)
 - OBicyclists (tourists, Alaska residents, Anchorage residents)
 - Commuters (through Downtown)
 - Occurrence (to and from Downtown)
 - Transit Users (through Downtown)
 - Transit Users (to and from Downtown)
 - oTour buses
 - oLarge freight (to and from Port)
 - Midsize freight (deliveries)
 - OPlace-making (festivals, parades, sidewalk shopping, sidewalk cafes, etc.)

Walking downtown is uncomfortable when:

- OAdjacent traffic is traveling at speeds above the human scale
- Snow and ice is not maintained
- There are breaks in the pedestrian network (difficult or prohibited crossings at intersections)

Biking downtown is uncomfortable when:

- Traveling along any street with more than one lane in the same direction and no dedicated biking facility
- oThere are breaks in the bicycle network (difficult or prohibited crossings at intersections)
- ODowntown stakeholders see reducing vehicle speeds as a key need.
