9:30 p.m. A day of "growing pains" officially began at 9:30 a.m. on the Park Strip when Odette Foster, vice chairman of the Borough Transportation Committee, slammed a bottle of champagne over a bus bumper and splashed Bor-

ough Mayor Jack Roderick DURING THE DAY one bus broke down in Mountain View another had a flat tire and two suffered vapor locks from the heat, Four smaller city buses. awaiting the installation of 40-gallon gus tunks, streaked back to the borough offices between runs to fill their 16-

gallon tanks.

Buses generally traveled 10-15 minutes behind schedule Monday, coping with rush hour traffic street flaggers. and bus stops swamped with questioning riders.
